Message from the Headmaster

During last week's school break, I had the chance to watch the British TV drama series Adolescence. I was drawn to it because of the growing conversation surrounding an article by Dr Ovid, a paediatric neurologist, which—like the series Adolescence—delves into the emotional and psychological challenges facing today's youth. While Dr Ovid offers a clinical diagnosis of the crisis, Adolescence brings it to life, portraying the struggles through a deeply human lens.

The link between these two sources is unmistakable: our children are struggling, and despite the many benefits of modern technology, it is eroding the core foundations they need to flourish. Both sources call on parents, schools, and society to pause, reflect on what truly matters, and prioritise connection, stability, and mindful engagement over ease, excess/indulgence and constant distraction.

1. Mental Health Crisis in Children and Teens

- Dr Ovid:
- Cites alarming statistics about rising ADHD, depression, and suicide rates among children and teens, calling it a "silent tragedy."
- Adolescence:
- Brings these mental health challenges to life through characters experiencing anxiety, depression, and emotional isolation.
- Correlation:
- Both sources agree that emotional struggles are real, escalating, and systemic—not just a phase.
- What can we do:
 - Recognise early signs of mental distress in children and teens and create space for open, honest conversations about emotions and mental well-being.

2. The Role of Technology

Dr Ovid:

Warns that digital distraction—especially from parents—is replacing emotional connection and overstimulating young minds.

• Adolescence:

• Shows how social media, screen addiction, and online pressures contribute to identity crises, low self-esteem, and bullying.

• Correlation:

• Technology, when misused, is a barrier to real connection, creativity, and emotional health.

What can we do:

- Be emotionally present—put phones down and be fully engaged.
- Build daily rituals for in-person connection, even in small ways.

3. Lack of Boundaries and Overindulgence

Dr Ovid:

 Highlights the dangers of permissive parenting and the absence of limits, leading to entitlement and emotional instability.

• Adolescence:

 Depicts teens who push boundaries and struggle with discipline due to lack of structure and accountability at home.

Correlation:

• Without structure and limits, young people are left vulnerable and emotionally adrift.

What can we do:

- Set consistent, age-appropriate rules and expectations.
- Don't be afraid to say "no"—it builds self-regulation and resilience.

4. Disconnection from Family and Real Life

Dr Ovid:

• Emphasizes the importance of emotionally available parents who spend quality time with their children.

Adolescence:

• Portrays teens who feel unseen, unheard, or misunderstood by the adults in their lives.

Correlation:

• What children need most is **emotional connection—not control or constant entertainment**.

What can we do:

- Establish tech-free zones like mealtimes and bedtime.
- Replace screen time with board games, storytelling, or outdoor activities.

5. Return to Simplicity and Human Essentials

Dr Ovid:

Advocates for a return to basics—adequate sleep, nutritious meals, outdoor play, and daily chores.

• Adolescence:

• Shows how healing begins when teens disconnect from digital chaos and rediscover meaningful, real-life experiences.

Correlation:

• Both encourage families to **slow down** and reintroduce routine, creativity, and real-world interaction into daily

• What can we do:

- Allow time for boredom—it inspires creativity and independence.
- Engage children in tasks that foster patience, imagination, and problem-solving.

Conclusion

Children don't need perfection—they need presence. By focusing less on convenience and more on meaningful connection, structure, and simplicity, we can help our children grow up with the emotional strength and resilience they need to face today's world.














A Rivalry Written in History

Graeme vs St Andrew's | Since 1878

There are rugby matches... and then there are fixtures that carry the weight of history. This weekend Graeme College and St Andrew's College meet once again in a derby that's been played for nearly 150 years — and it's one of the oldest schoolboy rugby rivalries in the country. First played in 1878, this isn't just a game. It's tradition passed down through generations. It's school pride, community spirit, and a bit of something you can't quite describe unless you've stood on the sidelines and felt it.

A Historic Weekend for SA Rugby

This weekend is a rare one. The three oldest schoolboy rugby derbies in South Africa are all being played: SACS vs Bishops – first played in 1873; Graeme vs St Andrew's – since 1878; Dale vs Queen's – since 1891 That's not just special — it's a celebration of where it all began.

St Andrew's College (founded in 1855) is the 6th oldest school in South Africa. Graeme College (founded in 1873) is the 22nd. But when it comes to tradition on the rugby field, both schools punch well above those numbers. Graeme claimed victory in that very first clash in 1878, and over the years, the fixture has only grown in significance. In 2006, it was named an FNB Classic Clash, drawing national attention and adding another layer of legacy. This derby is about far more than the First XV. It's a full-day festival of rugby, from U14s to the final whistle, with pupils, families, Old Boys, and the Makhanda community all showing up for the occasion.

A Proud Rugby Heritage

Both schools have produced standout players who've made their mark far beyond school fields.

Graeme Old Boys include:

- Hennie le Roux 1995 World Cup winner
- Kotaro Matsushima Japanese international, 2019 World Cup standout
- Batho Hlekani Current SA U20 player

Dirk de Vos, Tony Markow, and the Watson brothers among others

St Andrew's legends include:

• Nick Mallett, Ryan Kankowski, Russell Bennett, Danie Craven, and Sintu Manjezi

And let's not forget the milestones: Last year, St Andrew's celebrated 125 years of rugby on Lower Field The year before, Graeme marked its 150th anniversary

This derby isn't just about who lifts the trophy. It's about tradition. It's about legacy. It's about remembering where we come from and celebrating the spirit of schoolboy rugby in South Africa.

Congratulations to Joshua Danilatos!

Joshua was proudly awarded the Kilimani Leopard in a recent assembly in recognition of his outstanding achievement at the 2025 Rock and Surf Super Pro League (RASSPL) Africa Nationals, held over three days from April 23rd to 26th.

Joshua took 1st place in the Junior division, placed 6th overall, and—most impressively—earned a place on the RASSPL International Team! He will go on to represent the team at the international competition in Namibia next year.

Well done, Joshua! We are incredibly proud of you and can't wait to see what you achieve next.

Joshua Danilatos and Josh Potts took part in the 2025 Rock and Surf Super Pro League (RASSPL) Africa Nationals for 3 days between the 23rd and 26th April.

RASSPL competitions are 100% catch and release events. All species count and points are allocated according to their abundance or scarcity. Anglers are to catch as many different species possible in the given time. The highest points standing wins.

RASSPL works very closely with the Rhodes Department of Ichthyology and Fisheries Science (DIFS) conducting research on best handling practices for catch-and-releaae events and analysing catch and effort data. Rhodes students were on site recording air exposure time of fish, and making sure that all fish were appropriately handled.

All species (for all RASSPL competitions) are recorded on a database set up by the Rhodes Ichthyology and Fisheries Science Department. This has been ongoing since 2014 and is the only record of marine shore-based rock and surf species along the South African coastline.

Joshua Danilatos and Josh Potts were accompanied by Prof Warren Potts of Rhodes DIFS.

They were amongst 180 anglers from all over South Africa. Joshua Danilatos came first in the Junior section and 6 overall. Josh Potts came second in the junior section. Warren Potts came 1st in the senior section and 1st overall. They all made the RASSPL international team and will compete in Namibia next year. Well done!! We are so proud of you!






As the season nears its close, our boys, still have battles ahead. Here's what's coming up as we head into the final leg.

Teen App


We are delighted to announce that Graeme College has purchased a full membership of the VIVE TEEN WELLNESS application, which will enable ALL our learners to have full access to the app. It is something that we have thoroughly investigated, and feel that this is a massive step in the right direction for the wellbeing of our all learners. We are excited that every learner will have safe space to learn more about mental wellness, and reach out for help if needed, in a number of ways.

VIVE TEEN WELLNESS is an Artificial Intelligence enabled digital platform and smartphone application that was built in South Africa. The first version was launched earlier in 2023, with several schools presently using the full suite of functionality. The schools and learners that have been using the platform in recent months have provided us with very valuable feedback that assisted us in planning the next phase of the roll-out. During 2022 VIVE TEENS has been selected as a winner in the UpLink - World Economic Forum (WEF) Youth Mental Health Challenge where it has competed with over 120 other mental health companies from across the globe.

The platform is expected to launch internationally early in 2024, and as part of that process we are awarding South African schools the opportunity to gain from a locally built application and support the mental wellness of our children.

The Graeme College subscription starts from 1 September 2023, but we would like our learners to download the application in the meantime, and familiarise themselves with it by referring to the various videos and guides.


