

Last week we were delighted to welcome the St Andrew's College community to our campus for our derby fixture. This weekend that continues as the Junior School welcomes Prep. If you missed all the social media build up - there is a lot to be incredibly proud of. In a country which is absolutely rugby mad, it is incredible to know that this derby is officially the second oldest recorded in South Africa (and just a fraction behind the oldest). The annual derby is more than just a rugby match; it's a significant cultural event for both schools and the Makhanda community. The fixture often features multiple age-group matches, fostering school spirit and community engagement. In 2006, the match gained further prominence by achieving FNB Classic Clash status, attracting broader attention and sponsorship. The first recorded rugby match between Graeme and St Andrew's took place on 13 April 1878, with Graeme College securing a narrow victory over St Andrew's College. This fixture is among the earliest documented schoolboy rugby matches in South Africa, underscoring its historical importance in the nation's rugby heritage.

Over the years, this annual derby has become a cornerstone of both schools' sporting calendars, fostering a deep-rooted tradition that spans nearly a century and a half. Last year we celebrated the 125th year of rugby on Lower Field at St Andrew's. The year before we celebrated Graeme College's 150th year in existence, while St Andrew's have reached another incredible milestone as they celebrate their 170th year.

Speaking about the mad South African rugby culture - our own, Mr Swift, wrote an absolutely stunning article recently (which has been shared by some very prominent sport websites). It has some interesting statistics, but then also has some very profound and thought provoking statements. It evaluates the role of schools just like Graeme, in the overall growth and sustainability of the Springbok rugby success. It is a fascinating read, enjoy:

Schools' rugby and its link to the long term success of the Springboks:

"Below is the match-day squad for the 2023 Rugby World Cup final. There is also the school that the player attended and the school's ranking at the end of the 2024 season.

The strength and success of the Springboks, 4-times Rugby World Cup winners, is often linked to South Africa's much vaunted schools' rugby system. The understanding is that there is a clear link between the level of rugby played in schools and the success of the national team. How sustainable is the South African schools' rugby system in terms of producing generational Springboks? Should we rest on our laurels because we are current world champions, or should we interrogate current trends to ensure future success?

Schools' rugby has undergone fundamental shifts over the last 5 years, becoming increasingly professionalised, with greater concentrations of power and wealth in schools that are typically ranked in the Top 20. However, there has as yet been no response to these shifts from those who are tasked with guarding the future of the game in the country, namely SARU and SASRA.

Schools outside the Top 20 have found themselves under ever-increasing pressure as their player-resources have been plundered by schools with wealth and power. Top 20 schools call the practice 'scouting' while the schools who are plundered call it 'poaching'. Outside of the Western Province schools' league – where a framework has recently been introduced to manage learner movement between schools – the governing authorities have been silent as the game in schools has undergone radical changes. What will the consequences be if there are no fundamental systemic shifts in how the schools' game is governed?

Firstly, there will be an ever-increasing concentration of wealth and power in the top 10 to top 20 schools. This will in all likelihood end up as a semi-professional league featuring schools in the top 20 that will resemble a Varsity Cup-type tournament. Secondly, schools outside of this elite group will find it ever harder to put together meaningful rugby programmes, where young players are exposed to high quality coaching and development. Will this impact Springbok rugby? In the long run the table above suggests that it will and should be of significant concern to those governing the game.

From the table above we see that 57% of the Springboks who won the 2023 Rugby World Cup attended schools that in 2024 were ranked outside of the Top 40. Let that sink in for a moment. 30% attended schools who are ranked outside the Top 100.

Springbok rugby is strong not because we have 10 to 20 elite schools playing the game but because we have over a hundred schools with meaningful rugby programmes. These are the schools that rugby authorities have to protect – and they need to be protected with new, well thought out rugby-related legislation.

Those with wealth and power will continue to act in their own self-interest, it is the way that society works. However, governing authorities and legislative frameworks are there to ensure that this self-interest does not do damage to other sectors of society – and therefore damage to the 'collective', in this instance the national game. Regarding the movement of schoolboy rugby players, it is painfully obvious that a new legislative framework is long overdue. Primarily this should be done to safeguard rugby programmes across the entire spectrum of schools' rugby, which in turn sustain the long-term success of the national side over many decades.

Here's one option:

If School A would like the services of a player who is School B, then School B must sign a letter of release to formalise the process. If required, School A must compensate School B for the time and finances that have been invested in that player. School B (generally outside the Top 20) can then use this capital to invest in their rugby programme to ensure its future success.

Here's another:

Ban 'scouts' and 'agents' from interacting with schoolboys until after Craven Week in their matric year. Scouts generally have one priority and that is filling their own pockets. They have no concern for the damage that they do to individual schools when they manipulate boys to move away to schools with more wealth and power. They must be prevented from doing so by law – if there is the will to protect as many rugby programmes as possible and therefore the long-term future of South African rugby.

The table also gives truth to the lie that boys have to attend a Top 10 school to become a Springbok. This untruth is often peddled by 'scouts' and 'agents' and repeated by those with a vested interest to entice boys away from rugby schools outside the Top 20. However, the evidence is clear, you can become a Springbok at any school that offers a meaningful rugby programme – even those ranked outside the Top 100. The critical fact is that these schools must be left alone to thrive in their own space and not be undermined by those who have no concern for their future success.

There are other options available, but don't get caught up in the detail. The key point is that rugby authorities are watching a process unfold that is going to undermine the future success of both the entire schools' rugby system, as well as the long-term success of the game at a national level. Schools' rugby is also about more than performance on the field – it is deeply connected to the life of the whole school, in identity, culture and school pride. Rugby therefore has the ability to impact every corner of school life. In protecting rugby programmes across the entire spectrum of rugby-playing schools in South Africa, we will also be protecting these schools being 'special places' that build South African society.

The issues, although complex, are clear. We ignore them at our collective peril."

Such a stunning piece of writing - and he is absolutely correct. It is not always (and maybe rarely) the success of the powerhouse rugby schools that lead to the success of the Springboks - but rather all schools around the country developing their own communities. Such a powerful article. It puts perspective to how significant our derby fixture is then, in the context of South African rugby. There is no better evidence than watching Batho Hlekani doing what he does best on the world stage.

Mother's Day

"Heavenly Father, we thank You for the gift of motherhood. Today, we celebrate the loving sacrifice of mothers, both biological and spiritual, who nurture and guide us in Your ways. Bless them with joy, strength and love to continue their selfless devotion. May they feel deeply appreciated and honoured not just this weekend, but every day. Amen"

Just as Dr Shaw started Assembly a few weeks ago with a question, I too would like to start today's assembly with a question.

What do we celebrate on the Second Sunday in May?

We celebrate Mothers and what they mean to us. Some of us are not fortunate enough to still have a Mom around and nearby us. BUT I think if you think about it you will realise that there is at least one other lady who fills that role. Think for a moment: Who Mothers you?

When we consider Mother's Day, we can look at

different aspects of this special day and we can see different things depending on what lens we look through? If we look with a history lens, we will discover that Mother's Day is largely due to the work of Ann Jarvis and her daughter Anna who lived in America. Ann Jarvis was involved in prompting general public health, organising women's groups to care for soldiers during the American Civil War and also campaigning for peace. After Ann's death, Anna, her daughter wanted to honour her mother's legacy by establishing a national Mother's Day on the second Sunday in May. She finally succeeded in her quest for official recognition and President Wilson issued a proclamation of the first national Mothers Day just before the start of World War I in 1914. It has since become an internationally recognised day.

If we look through an economics or commercial lens, we see that today Mother's Day involves lots of advertising and marketing to convince people to buy many things like, flowers, chocolates and clothing etc. for their mothers. Interestingly, by the late 1930s Anna Jarvis was horrified at how commercial Mother's Day had become and she considered trying to have it stopped.

Of course, I have to comment on looking through a biological lens at Mothers. As humans, we inherit genes and characteristics from both of our parents but children get their mitochondria exclusively from their mothers and not their fathers. I think that's pretty special.

If we look through an Accountant's lens, and we form a balance sheet with debits and credits, we will find that we owe a huge debit to our Mom's for all the love they give us. There is no way that credit column (which we need to fill) equals the debit column. Which makes we wonder –how could we fix this?

If we look at Mom's through the lens of love, we will find that they show a very special type of love that is called Agape. There are many different types of love, and through the eons of time, many people and philosophers have tried to describe them. The Bible describes three

distinct types of love:

Eros: Romantic love.

Philia: Deep and meaningful friendships.

Agape: Unconditional, divine love.

Agape is the type of love that Mom's show to their children and those that they care for. It is undeserved, unconditional love that is always there no matter what you might have done. It doesn't mean that there aren't consequences for negative behaviours, but it does mean

that regardless of those behaviours, a Mother will still love you and care about you.

With this unconditional type of love that is given to us every day of the year, how can we go about showing our love and appreciation for the women that are our Mothers this weekend?

During library time, the Grade 2 class watched a delightful reading of the book Love Monster, a sweet story about a monster searching for love and friendship.


After the reading, the students wrote their own heartfelt and creative messages to the Love Monster.

For Grade 7 Technology in Term 2, boys had to work on the design and construction of a tower. Many boys produced really stunning work, which makes marking a joy!




























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Grade 11s







Teen App


We are delighted to announce that Graeme College has purchased a full membership of the VIVE TEEN WELLNESS application, which will enable ALL our learners to have full access to the app. It is something that we have thoroughly investigated, and feel that this is a massive step in the right direction for the wellbeing of our all learners. We are excited that every learner will have safe space to learn more about mental wellness, and reach out for help if needed, in a number of ways.

VIVE TEEN WELLNESS is an Artificial Intelligence enabled digital platform and smartphone application that was built in South Africa. The first version was launched earlier in 2023, with several schools presently using the full suite of functionality. The schools and learners that have been using the platform in recent months have provided us with very valuable feedback that assisted us in planning the next phase of the roll-out. During 2022 VIVE TEENS has been selected as a winner in the UpLink - World Economic Forum (WEF) Youth Mental Health Challenge where it has competed with over 120 other mental health companies from across the globe.

The platform is expected to launch internationally early in 2024, and as part of that process we are awarding South African schools the opportunity to gain from a locally built application and support the mental wellness of our children.

The Graeme College subscription starts from 1 September 2023, but we would like our learners to download the application in the meantime, and familiarise themselves with it by referring to the various videos and guides.
